WHAT ABOUT SIBLINGS?

Brothers and sisters, age seven and under, can come to Institute. They will go to activities for their age group at The Nursery School on the ISD campus. They will also stay with their families in the dorms and go to recreational activities.

WHAT DOES IT COST?

There is no cost for families who come to Institute. The classes, lectures and evaluations are all free. Meals and housing are provided at no charge on the campus of the Illinois School for the Deaf. Scholarships will be given to families for their week of participation.

WHAT DO PARENTS DO?

The parents go to classes every day. They learn about children and hearing loss. They also meet in groups to discuss their concerns. Parents attend daily lectures by experts. Lecture topics include child development, types of hearing loss, language development, parent rights, school programs, communication choices, hearing aids, cochlear implants, and Deaf Culture.

WHAT IS THE INSTITUTE?

The Institute is a one-week program for parents of children (up to age five) who have a significant hearing loss. The Institute is held during June on the campus of the Illinois School for the Deaf. Parents learn about hearing loss. They also learn about their child's individual strengths and needs. Parents will meet other parents who also have children who are deaf or hard of hearing.

WHAT DO CHILDREN DO?

Each morning the children go to classrooms supervised by experienced teachers. They are given otological, hearing, vision, psychological, speech, language and educational evaluations.

WHERE IS THE INSTITUTE?

The Institute is held at the Illinois School for the Deaf in Jacksonville. Jacksonville is 30 miles west of Springfield on Interstate 72.
